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CORPORATE SPONSORSHIPS:

Deepening the Circle's Grants Pool

The Steering and Membership Committees of the Baltimore Women's Giving Circle are excited to announce a new corporate sponsor initiative.

The working group behind this initiative discovered that the BWGC was the largest giving circle of its size without a corporate sponsorship program. The group concluded that the BWGC should seek money from corporate giving funds to grow its grant pool and membership. The BWGC's reputation for careful vetting of small- to medium-sized local nonprofits and focus on nonprofits serving women and children make it a strong contender for corporate funds.

According to the Women's Philanthropy Network of LA, charitable giving to women's and girls' organizations represents a tiny share of overall giving (1.9% in 2018). This statistic, combined with a description of the Circle's successful vetting (and follow-up) protocols, could spur local corporations and businesses to focus their giving on nonprofits serving women and girls in the Baltimore area.

The initiative is voluntary and initially focused on BWGC members who work for corporations with a matching gift program that will match or increase the amount of the employee's membership dues donation. Businesses contributing to the BWGC have the benefit of recognition from a group of more than 450 women.

Thanks to member Susan Hovanec, the Circle has its inaugural sponsor, The Winslow Group at RBC Wealth Management. The BWGC is grateful for their trailblazing generosity.

CONVERSATION INITIATIVE

The first REDI Conversation Initiative team event was also the first Circle event open to members of the public. Held virtually on February 23, 2023, the theme was "Data that Makes a Difference: Listen to Those who Know" with speakers Cheryl Knott (Interim Director and Research Manager, Baltimore Neighborhood Indicators Alliance), Odette Ramos (Baltimore City Councilwoman, District IV), and Scot Spencer (Associate Director, Local Policy, Annie E. Casey Foundation). They discussed the collection of relevant community data and how it can be applied to policy- and grant-making. Dawna Cobb moderated the session and the Q&A that followed.

Seventy-one people tuned in, including 49 Circle members and 22 members of the public. All registrants received a follow-up email that included the <u>YouTube link</u>.

Thanks to planning committee members Phyllis Kolman, Leslie Glickman, Peggy Cohen, Susan Sachs Fleishman, Hannah Pickworth, and Crickett Woloson, moderator Dawna Cobb, and technical guidance from the Circle's administrative assistant, Lisa Calixto.

Grant Learning Lab

After a positive response to the 2022 membership survey, the Steering Committee asked the REDI Committee to explore a pilot grant-making project now known as the Grant Learning Lab.

A team consisting of three respected community leaders and two Circle members is exploring ways to use the concepts of participatory grantmaking and trust-based philanthropy to create an experimental grants process to grant the \$25,000 designated for the Lab. The lab is not meant to replace the Circle's successful traditional grants model but to be an opportunity to explore ways to encourage participation from small, often overlooked nonprofits that meet our mission. Calling on her many years as an organizational development consultant, Jane Berkow led more than 20 women through several discussions about proposed changes to the Circle's mission and values statements and the creation of a proposed vision statement. From designing the agendas, framing the questions, and leading the discussions, Jane helped the group reach a consensus on proposed language that will soon be shared with the entire Circle.







March Full Circle

"Hearing and Your Brain" was the food for thought at the March Full Circle meeting at Church of the Redeemer. Johns Hopkins researcher Jennifer Deal, PhD, an epidemiologist who focuses on dementia, shared insights into hearing loss and aging with 72 Circle members and more on Zoom. Deal said that most hearing loss is gradual, and the problem is clarity, not volume. This makes it more difficult to understand speech, which can lead to other problems. There also appears to be an increased risk of dementia for people with hearing loss. Deal said a randomized study is wrapping up that is testing if hearing aids plus therapy and other measures to treat hearing loss can help prevent dementia. Grantee Connect

The purpose of Grantee Connect is to facilitate learning and networking among BWGC grantees. Starting out as a subcommittee under Post Grants in 2008, it was designed to foster relationships among past and present grantees and increase members' understanding of the organizations and their impact.

Today, Grantee Connect is a full-fledged committee whose signature program is the Grantee Forum, a twice-a-year event that brings together all alumni and currently funded grantee partners for a morning of learning and connecting. Topics have included "Partnerships for Success", "Board Development", and the upcoming "Raising Funds Creatively," to be held May 16. Grantees choose the topics for discussion at each Forum.

True to its beginnings, Grantee Connect remains a place "by grantees for grantees", with Circle members involved only as facilitators of the free flow of ideas among peers. Committee Reports

POST GRANTS

The BWGC Post Grants liaisons establish and maintain relationships with Grantees through site visits and review of midyear reports. By the time the Midyear Report milestone is achieved, Post Grants liaisons have built a connection with their grantee partner and have a good indication of Grantee progress. This year, all 26 midyear reports were on time with almost no concerns expressed. Liaisons attribute this in part to the return of in person site visits and the opportunity to develop interpersonal relationships that encourage issues to be resolved early. Of the 26 Grantees, 11 are first-time recipients, defined by the Circle as "grassroots organizations", with five or fewer employees and budgets of approximately \$250,000.

GRANTEE CONNECT

For the first time in three years, the Grantee Connect Forum will be held in person on May 16.

The program, offered twice a year for all BWGC grantees and Grantee Connect Committee members, will focus on fundraising. And not just any fundraising strategy, but "raising funds creatively".

The Committee asked a group of grantee partners to suggest topics for the forum. They were eager to learn more about out-of-the-box fundraising methods. The Forum will feature Grantees sharing their fundraising strategies, then give the other Grantees in attendance imaginary scenarios, enabling them to develop their own creative ways to meet their funding needs.

GRANTS

Since January, the Grants Committee has been hard at work reviewing applications, conducting in-person site visits after two years of visiting applicants virtually, and holding meetings to decide which of the 92 grant applicants to recommend for funding to the entire Circle membership.

The 2023 Grantees will be announced at the May 17 Full Circle meeting.

2023 - 24 Funding Round: Voting Status and Timeline

Voting for 2023-24 grantees is now underway and will be completed on April 23. If you did not register to vote and complete a voter training session, you are ineligible to vote for grantees in the current funding round. The winning grantees for 2023-24 will be announced at the May 17 Full Circle meeting.

The meeting will be hybrid, so please plan to attend in person or virtually.
